In addition to transportation and municipal government, Matt also advises the Governor on public pensions and is the Chair of the Self-Driving Oversight Committee. Matt served as the primary contact between the Councilmember and members of the public as well as City of Mesa staff. In his role with the city, he monitored the implementation of policy and projects initiated by the Councilmember and assisted the City's intergovernmental Relations Office on specific legislative projects.
